
















A harmonious hobby

"Barber shop is love," says Gordon Harris.

Harris is not a hair fetishist, or even a fancier of striped poles, two chairs and no waiting. His affection runs more to the "Shave and a Haircut: two bits" aspect of the shops.

From nine to five Harris is a car salesman, but after hours he becomes the public relations man for the Langley Chapter of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet singing in America, (SPEBS-QSA - pronounce it spebscoosa if you can).

A member of the chapter for the last seven years, and lead singer of the newlyformed Canadian Sunset quartet for the past twelve weeks or so, Harris is singing the praises of what he calls the art form of barbershopping.

"You can't really explain it. You have to do it. I much prefer quartet singing: the feeling of united sound is incredible; it's a very close feeling," he says.

The whole idea is harmony, both of voices and the people who use them, he says, SPEB-SOSA has no religious or political affiliations or leanings, but expects any prospective member to have not only a good voice but respect for his fellow human beings

"I love rock and roll myself," he contends. "But the harmonies are all background B.S. The beat is the motivating force behind it

- that's the problem with today's music. It's unsingable.'

Barber shop harmony is ultimately 'singable,' in his option. By anybody.

"The only tone deaf person is a deaf person. Eveyone can be taught to sing. The ones who try to train their voices and fail just can't regiment themselves to listening to themselves sing. We call them crows."

Part of the SPEBSOSA's weekly practice is music and voice training, he explains, and anyone who wishes to train himself out of his 'tonedeafness' will be helped to do

The association also helps those who truly have a problem with speech or hearing. It is committed to the Institute of Logopedics, and has been named an Outstanding

The association's motto reflects this commitment to the retraining of children with speech and hearing defects: 'We sing that they shall speak."

The First Capital Chorus finished with 328 points behind first place Mount Baker Toppers from Bellingham with 432 points and the Gentlemen of Fortune from Burnaby with 410 points. Three other choruses from B.C.. Kamloops, Victoria and Vancouver, failed to qualify with the minimum required score of 325 points.
